Telecom to stop paying Ulster 'danger money'

British Telecom is to stop the annual payment it has made to Northern Ireland employees in recent years because of the dangers of working in the province. A similar decision is expected from the Post Office, from which BT was recently separated:

The six unions involved were not consulted in advance.

The move came to light when the BT union negotiators made a routine claim for the allowance to be renewed and updated. BT managers said they did not think that the allowance was justified any more, and that they did not want to discuss it further.

The decision has not yet been reported to rank and

file members but unless the corporation has a change of heart, it is bound to be raised at union conferences in the next couple of

The unions involved are the Communications Workers, Post Office Engineers, Post Office Executives, Communication Managers, and two Civil Service unions the CPSA and SCPS.

Communication workers value the recognition that they face occasional danger and constant security restrictions. The money is regarded as less important that the principle.

The allowance is an annual flat rate payment to everyone from the regional chairman to the lower paid cleaners. For the past two years it has been £60 costing BT about £125,000.

Conference delegates will no doubt remember listening to Gerry Forsythe, Branch Secretary, Belfast GMO seconding that Motion by detailing to us the realities that exist for all BT Employees living and working in Northern Ireland today. PRODUCTIVITY

AGREEMENT has been reached with BT on a further 1% productivity bonus payment to be paid to all CPSA represented grades, including HCO and consequentially EO. This payment is made under the terms of the 1981 Pay Settlement and is based on the productivity improvements recorded over the financial year 1981/82.

This 1% payment, combined with the 1% bonus already awarded in November 1981, means a total bonus pay nent of 2% for the year 1981/82.

The 1% is due to be paid out in the end of July pay packets and members should receive 1% of their position on the pay scale as at 1 July 1982. Part-time staff will receive a payment pro-rata to hours actually worked

As the productivity bonus relates to productivity improvements recorded during the period 1 April 1981 - 31 March 1982, members who joined BT after 1 April 1981 will receive a payment pro-rata to their length of service during that period.

Arrangements are being made to implement the same payment in July to members in both Posts and National Girobank.

PAY

THE CPSA P & T Group Executive Committee have submitted pay claims to BT, National Girobank and Posts on behalf of all the members concerned. Negotiations are well under way but no settlement has been reached.

BT have made an offer which approximates to a 4.3% increase in pay rates and National Giro have offered an across the board increase of 5%. Neither of these offers forms an acceptable basis for settlement and negotiations
